





I loaded both smaller figures and my larger figure into the kiln






I glazed both my smaller figures.

My hand was glazed and raku fired.








Glazed bunny spine.






I'm leaning more towards Cel Shading

I made a slab and cut the circle to the correct dimensions for the base. I then started to coil the sides.





I continued to coil up the sides. I then made a slab for the palm and built it up to the proper shape. I built the fingers and hollowed out the palm.





I molded the fingers solid and added a slab to the open hole in the palm to attach fingers later.





I scored and slipped the fingers to the palm. I added some clay to better form the hand shape. I then cut out and added wings to the back of the wrist.





I loaded both my smaller figures and larger version in the kiln.









Cel shaded room temp. painted large hand

Bowl Concept Drawings





I carved my designs into both solid bowl shaped clay chunks.



I placed the bowl into a bucket and covered it with plaster to make the plaster mold in my bucket.

Started to make multiple copies of my bowl and let them dry.






I cleaned the rims of my bowls.






I put my four bowls in the kiln.





Mixed the bins of glaze to make sure there were no lumps.






I dumped each bowl into the glazes.









Reference for food dish.

I cut a slab for the lid and put it on a sponge to have it dry in a arch shape.





Propped up the lid as I attached the sides.

I started painting the underglazes.





I finished painting and loaded it into the kiln.






My serving dish came out of the kiln after the first firing.
